



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# GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS

## GENERAL REGULATIONS

1. The Clay County Fair will operate from 7:00 a.m. until 9:00 p.m. each day, Thursday, July 14 through Sunday, July 17, 2016.

2. **The Clay County Fair Association has the right to refuse or reject any display or exhibit.**

3. The Clay County Fair Board reserves the final and absolute right to interpret these rules and regulations and determine all matters, questions and differences in regard thereto, or otherwise arising out of, connected with, or incident to the fair.

4. The Clay County Fair Board will take every precaution in its power for the preservation of articles and stock on exhibition, but will not be responsible for any loss or damage that may occur in the delivery, exhibition or removal of the exhibits. Owners will be held responsible for any damage that may be done by animals to persons or property while on the fairgrounds.

5. **No person shall be permitted to distribute advertising matter on the fairgrounds except from their place of business or exhibit.** The tacking or posting of any advertisements, bills, cards, etc., or soliciting or selling of any nature, other than within the space occupied by the exhibitor, is strictly prohibited. The distribution of handbills, flyers, heralds, etc., will not, under any circumstances be permitted. Anyone violating this rule shall be liable to a fine or expulsion from the grounds as the Clay County Fair Board may elect.

6. **No dogs are allowed on grounds EXCEPT** for service dogs, used in conjunction with a judged exhibit, or entertainment.

## ADMISSION, PARKING & TRANSPORTATION

7. The Clay County Fair offers free admission to all visitors. There is a charge for grandstand events, midway rides and concessions, etc.

8. There is a charge to park on the fairgrounds - \$2 per day or \$5 for a season pass.

9. **Golf carts, ATVs and similar vehicles of conveyances shall be limited to fair personnel and staff.** Licensed drivers must be a minimum of 18 years. Disabled persons with motorized wheelchairs will be allowed. Fair board will review requests on a case by case basis.

10. **No riding of bikes** are allowed on the fairgrounds.

## PRE-REGISTRATION & REGISTRATION

11. A Non-Livestock entry form can be found on page 33. **Pre-registration is strongly encouraged.** Mail completed Non-Livestock entry form to Clay County Fair, PO Box 376, Barnesville, MN 56514 before July 11, 2016.

12. A Livestock entry form can be found on page 18. **Pre-registration is strongly encouraged.** Mail completed Livestock entry form to Brian Halverson, 12483 100th Avenue South, Baker, MN 56580 by July 1, 2016.

13. Registrations will also be taken on Entry Day, Thursday, July 14, 2016.

14. **All entries must be made and exhibits brought in Thursday, July 14 from 8:00 a.m. until 8:00 p.m. Perishable items, such as flowers, fresh vegetables and sheaf grains, must be entered on Thursday, July 14, but can be brought in and put in place by 8:30 a.m. Friday, July 15.**

15. Tags for pre-registered entries will be ready on Entry Day at the Open Class building or designated animal barn. Changes may still be made.

## EXHIBITS

16. The exhibitor must create all entries. Stock must be the bona fide property of the exhibitor. Flowers, grain, vegetables, fruit, dairy products and domestic manufactures must have been made or grown by the exhibitors during the past year.

17. Every article in competition must correspond in proper division, class and lot in order to obtain a premium. The clerk may offer suggestions, but the responsibility of determining the proper classification shall rest on the exhibitor. No change or alteration will be permitted after the books are placed in the hands of the judges.

18. The "any other" or "unclassified" lot is to be used only if entry cannot be categorized into another lot.

19. Only one entry in each lot will be allowed EXCEPT livestock and poultry, where an exhibitor is allowed to make up to two entries per

lot unless otherwise specified.

20. No animals or articles will be assigned a place on the grounds until entry has been made. On receipt of entry, a tag will be provided for each article corresponding in number and description with the premium list.

21. Each entry tag shall be securely attached to the entry itself, or the stall, pen or receptacle in which it is shown.

22. Ample accommodations will be provided for all collections. No collection shall be allowed space that is not neatly arranged and fully labeled. A duplication of varieties in any collection of grain and feed crops debar the collection from prize money. Standard varieties will be given the preference.

23. Exhibits of a non-competitive nature may be made with the approval of the open class superintendent or fair manager.

24. All exhibits that are not called for within two days after the fair will be forfeited to the Fair Association Clay County Fair Board.

## JUDGING

25. Judging will begin at 9:00 a.m. on Friday, July 15. **The Open Class Building will be closed during the judging process and reopen once the exhibits have been judged.**

26. No articles or exhibits will be permitted to be taken away before 7:00 p.m. on the closing day of the fair, Sunday, July 17, under penalty of forfeiture of premium, except by permission of the management. Exhibitor must have claim stubs when picking up entries at the close of the fair.

## LIVESTOCK

27. **Exhibitors must obey the latest rules and regulations of the Minnesota Livestock Sanitary Board governing public exhibition of livestock and poultry in Minnesota.**

28. Reservations for cattle, swine, sheep and goats must be made with Brian Halverson no later than July 1. **ENTRY FEES WILL BE DOUBLED AFTER THIS DATE.**

29. The Clay County Fair Board reserves the right to accept only as many entries as can conveniently be accommodated.

30. No article or animal shall be able to compete for more than one premium except livestock when competing in teams or groups. An animal entered in Open Class may not compete in 4-H Classes or FFA Classes. This rule shall not debar sweepstakes or special premium competition for which no entry is required.

31. See additional Livestock rules and regulations on page 19.

## PREMIUMS & AWARDS

32. Ribbons shall designate the awards in each lot as follows: first-blue ribbon, second-red ribbon, and third-white ribbon.

33. A Grand Champion and Reserve Champion ribbon will be awarded in each class based on merit per the judge.

34. One Best Of Show ribbon for an adult and one Best of Show ribbon for a youth will be given in each division based on merit.

35. A Parade of Champions will be held on Sunday, July 17, 6:30 p.m. at the Band Shelter.

36. Awards and premiums will not be awarded on articles or animals of inferior merit, regardless of the number in competition for a premium. The judge may award no premium, third, second or first premium as merit may warrant, stating the reasons in writing when requested.

37. No article or animal shall compete for more than one premium. **SEE EXCEPTION FOR LIVESTOCK AND POULTRY UNDER LIVESTOCK RULES.** This rule shall not debar sweepstakes or special premium competition for which no entry is required.

38. Premium awards will be paid and distributed in front of the Main Exhibit building beginning at 7:00 p.m. on the last day of the fair, Sunday, July 17.

39. Premium checks must be redeemed within 90 days of the fair or they will be null and void.

40. The Clay County Fair Board reserves the right to prorate the premium money if the total premiums exceed \$1,750.

41. Premiums will not be paid on articles or animals removed from exhibition before the official dismissal time except as permitted by a Clay County Fair official.

# GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS CONTINUED

## PROTESTS & APPEALS

43. Any interference by exhibitors to influence or dictate the decision of the judges will be sufficient cause for excluding his or her entry from competition.

43. The superintendent of the division, or some other person appointed, shall assist the awarding committee as clerk and shall keep a

record of the awards made. This completed record shall be returned to the Clay County Fair computer technician.

44. No appeal from the decision of the awarding committee shall be allowed. An exhibitor may make protest to the superintendent of the division at the time of the award, who may then require the judges to give reasons for such placing.



# LIVESTOCK RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. Reservations for cattle, swine, sheep and goats must be made with Brian Halverson no later than July 1. **ENTRY FEES WILL BE DOUBLED FOR ENTRIES RECEIVED AFTER THIS DATE.**

2. No exhibitor of livestock shall be allowed to make more than two entries in one lot. In the special groups and production contests, an exhibitor may make only one entry in each lot.

3. Exhibitors of livestock must keep their stock, stalls and pens in good, neat conditions and open for inspection from 9:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m. **All animal waste material must be removed and placed outside by 9:00 a.m. each day so it can be picked up.**

4. It is the responsibility of the exhibitor to be informed of when their stock will be judged. Stock must be in the show ring promptly after being called. Any exhibitor failing to comply with this order will be ruled out of competition.

5. Ample sheds and pens for livestock on exhibition and competing for premiums will be furnished. Pen reservations must be made before July 1, 2016. See page 18 for entry form.

6. Sires, dames and groups entered as such must be owned by the individuals or firms exhibiting them, but the progeny of animals may be shown simply as proof of their breeding qualities without such ownership.

7. Calves under two months of age at the time of the exhibition will not be eligible for competition.

8. All animals under exhibition shall be shown to the judges under the supervision of the superintendent.

9. All exhibitors of bulls, one year or over must lead such animals with a suitable staff attached to a nose ring.

10. In all classes which call for registered stock, all animals over one year must be accompanied by certificate of registration showing that the animal is properly registered in the stud-book, herd-book or flock-book, which is recognized as being authentic for the breed which the animal is supposed to represent.

11. Purebred animals under one year of age shall not be required to show certificate of registration, but the exhibitor of such animal shall be required to give a certified statement that both sire and dame of such animal are properly registered purebreds.

12. Unless otherwise stated, the dates of computing ages of animals entered shall be July 1.

13. Superintendent of each livestock division will check registration papers of all purebred livestock sometime during the fair.

**GENERAL REQUIREMENTS**---All animals must be examined by the official veterinarian on the day they are admitted to the exhibition and at least once daily during the exhibition.

All out of state animals must meet Minnesota importation requirements.

No animal may enter or be at a public exhibition that is showing clinical signs of any infections, contagious or communicable disease, including ringworm and warts.

**CATTLE**---Cattle must be officially identified prior to exhibition.

**SWINE**---Breeding and feeding swine, except for those in slaughter-only classes, must be officially identified prior to exhibition. \*

**SHEEP AND GOATS**---All sheep and goats must be officially identified.\* No sheep and goat that is within 30 days of giving birth (before or after) may be exhibited unless the exhibition management has received prior approval from the Board of Animal Health.

\* **Official ID may not be removed from an animal once it is applied.**

**POULTRY**---All chickens, turkeys, and game birds at exhibitions, except baby poultry, must be individually identified with a leg or wing band.

Chickens, turkeys game birds, and hatching eggs from these birds must be accompanied by a certificate or test chart approved by the Board of Animal Health to show compliance with Pullorum-typhoid, Mycoplasma gallisepticum and Mycoplasma synoviae.

**HORSES**---All horses, except suckling foals accompanying a negative dam, must be negative to an official equine infectious anemia (EIA) test conducted within 12 months prior to the opening date of the exhibition.

**DOGS**---Dogs four months of age or older must be accompanied by a certificate of rabies vaccination issued by a licensed veterinarian.

**IMPORTED ANIMALS**---All imported animals must be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection and meet the Board's importation requirements.

**SLAUGHTER CLASSES**---All cattle, swine and poultry entered in this calls, which are kept isolated in a separate building from all other livestock and poultry at the exhibition and which are slaughtered during or immediately following the exhibition, do not require tests or individual identification.





No test shall be required on poultry originating directly from parent stock that was tested and found to be negative within the preceding 12 months.

3. An officially recognized form signed by an authorized agent must be present to show compliance with this section. Official forms from other states shall be approved by the official agency of state or origin. Each bird shall be identified and band number recorded on the official form.

4. Applications for entry must be made and entry fees paid on or before July 1 using Livestock Entry and Pen Reservation form on page 18.

5. Entries will be accepted on a first come basis until the coops are filled. EXHIBITORS SEND IN ADVANCE REGISTRATION. State breed name and lot number.

6. No exhibitor is allowed more than two entries in each lot and only one entry in pairs, groups and production lots. No bird or rabbit shall compete for more than one premium except when competing in pairs or groups.

7. Entries from the same family may be limited depending on space.

8. All entries must be in cages and in place by 8:00 p.m., Thursday, July 14 and will not be released until 7:00 p.m., Sunday, July 17.

9. Feeders, water containers and cages will be furnished.

10. All exhibitors must report to fair entry clerk on entry day, Thursday, July 14, to secure entry tags and insure proper recording of entry.

## FRESH VEGETABLE, HERB PREPARATION

To assist the gardener in selecting and preparing vegetables for exhibit, the following suggestions are made.

**BEANS, SNAP** -- Harvest before constrictions appear between seeds, when seeds are about half-grown. Ends of pods should not be broken off in picking. Pods should be uniform in size. Pods should be wiped clean, but not washed. Leave stems attached.

**BEETS, CARROTS** -- Root crops should be mature, but not over grown, pithy or course in texture. Trim tops off 1-1/4 or 1-1/2 inches above the crown. Trim side roots off but not the taproot. Clean by brushing.

**BROCCOLI** -- Heads should be dark or purplish green and compact. Avoid yellow flowers in head. Cut stems about 5 inches from top of head.

**CABBAGE** -- Cut stems about 1/2 or 1/4 inch below the head. Remove blemished or broken leaves. Leave a few wrapper leaves. Specimens may be washed.

**CELERY** - Remove the roots of stalk and trim butt to form a triangle for pyramid. Trim diseased and broken leaves on outside until color is uniform.

**CUCUMBERS** -- Pickling - Select fruits 3 to 4 inches long. Specimens should be same stage of maturity and uniform in size, shape and color. Slicers - Select fruits that are

straight, dark green and 6 to 10 inches long. They should be uniform in size, shape and color. Leave stems attached. Clean with a soft brush.

**HERBS** -- Exhibit fresh cut herbs with stems in a container of water. Remove leaves below the water line so they do not rot. Leaves should be fresh and have no blemishes, bruises, or insect and disease damage.

**KOHLRABI** -- Remove roots just below the ball. Remove all but the center 4 to 6 leaves. Select specimens that are uniform, medium size and not hard or woody. Skin should be easily punctured by thumbnail. They should be clean, but not washed.

**LETTUCE** -- Specimens should have fresh, crisp, well-colored leaves. Remove older outer leaves that show yellowing. Place roots in jar of water.

**ONIONS** -- Have specimens mature and thoroughly cured. The neck should be small. Do not peel to give a slick appearance. Only such outer scales that are broken or discolored should be removed. Cut tops 1-1/2 inches long. Small basal roots should be left intact, but trimmed to a uniform length of 1/2 inch. Wipe or brush, but do not wash.

**PEAS** -- Select bright, green well-filled pods with seeds, the best eating stage. Do not wash, as bloom should be preserved.

**PEPPERS** -- Stem should be left 1/2 to 1 inch long.

**POTATOES** -- Tubers should be uniform in size, shape and color. Washing is permitted but do not blemish the skin by scrubbing. Avoid specimens with defects or disease.

**RADISHES** -- Cut taproot 1/2 inch and cut tops to 1/2 inch.

**RHUBARB** -- Select stalks that are straight, uniform and unblemished. Stalks should be pulled from the plant, not cut. Cut off blade leaf 2 inches above the stalk.

**SPINACH** -- Select uniformly, colored, clean, fresh, crisp leaves. Wash in cold water. Stalks should be pulled from the plant. Trim off roots to crown. Remove outer damaged leaves. Place in jar of water to prevent wilting.

**SUMMER SQUASH** -- Select small to medium size fruit when the rind is soft and easily punctured with thumbnail. Leave about 1/2 inch of stem and wipe fruits clean.

**TOMATOES** -- Select fruits that are uniform in size, shape and color. Leave 1/2 inch stem on or remove stems. Fruits should be free of cracks and blemishes.
