MINUTES

The Clay County Board of Commissioners met in regular session with the following Commissioners present: Frank Gross, Jim Haney, Kevin Campbell, Jenny Mongeau, and Grant Weyland. Others present or joining remotely: County Attorney Brian Melton, County Administrator Stephen Larson, and Senior Administrative Assistant Colleen Eck.

CALL TO ORDER

Chair Gross called the meeting to order.

APPROVAL OF AGENDA

On motion by Commissioner Weyland, seconded by Commissioner Haney, and unanimously carried, the Board approved the agenda with one addition: Request to Renew 3.2% Malt Liquor License for Willow Creek Golf Course, Barnesville: County Administrator Stephen Larson

FILL VACANCY FOR DATA COORDINATOR/APPRaiser IN ASSESSOR'S OFFICE

By consent, the Board approved the request to fill a vacancy for a Data Coordinator/Appraiser in the Assessor's Office.

FILL VACANCY FOR PUBLIC HEALTH NURSE

By consent, the Board approved the request to fill a vacancy for a Public Health Nurse.

INCOME CONTRACT AGREEMENT FOR CLAY/BECKER COUNTY TREATMENT COURT

By consent, the Board approved the Income Contract Agreement for Clay/Becker County Treatment Court.

CITIZENS TO BE HEARD

During this pandemic, citizens continue to have the opportunity to share feedback at board meetings via website link. Mr. Larson noted there have been no requests submitted for this meeting.

APPROVAL OF PAYMENT OF BILLS AND VOUCHERS

On motion by Commissioner Haney, seconded by Commissioner Campbell, and unanimously carried, the Board approved payment for bills and vouchers totaling \$1,090,817 from 121 vendors. From that total, 93 warrants issued were under \$2,000 (\$39,957) and the following 28 were over \$2,000:

APPROVAL OF MINUTES FROM APRIL 28, 2020

On motion by Commissioner Campbell, seconded by Commissioner Weyland, and unanimously carried, the Board approved the minutes from April 28, 2020.

ADDITION: REQUEST TO RENEW 3.2% MALT LIQUOR LICENSE FOR WILLOW CREEK GOLF COURSE, BARNESVILLE

On motion by Commissioner Mongeau, seconded by Commissioner Campbell, and unanimously carried, the Board renewed the 3.2% malt liquor license for Willow Creek Golf Course in Barnesville.

COVID-19 UPDATE

Public Health Director Kathy McKay, Director of Nursing Jamie Hennen, and Public Health Nurse Cheryl Sapp were present with the weekly COVID-19 update.

Ms. McKay provided the trend of positive COVID-19 cases in Clay County. On April 21 there were 69 and as of May 11 there were 246 cases and 17 deaths. There were also 821 cases in Cass County, ND, and 27 deaths reported to date. The numbers are still trending upward with congregate care facilities carrying a big percent of them. The Governor has requested the formation of a Red River Valley Task Force. The task force is assigned to work on strategies for long-term facilities where some of the most vulnerable population resides. They are assessing testing, repeat testing, cleaning procedures, situations where staff have tested positive, and isolating residents who have tested positive.

Ms. Hennen noted that they train and monitor staff and assure there is adequate Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) at the long-term care facilities. She reported that staff have done a great job in protecting the residents they serve. Daily contact between Public Health and the facilities has been very effective.

Ms. Sapp stated a survey was recently developed and she receives the results electronically. They check the number of positive cases, make sure the necessary supplies are available, and being used properly. They provide education on websites regarding contamination and PPE. She commented they have strengthened their relationships with the long-term care facilities.

Commissioner Mongeau reiterated that contact tracing continues to be a concern. She was informed that Cheryl Sapp and one other individual have started training for contact tracing. In turn they will be able to train others locally. All testing for Clay County residents continues to be through Sanford and Essentia. The nasal swab tests are currently sent to Mayo in Rochester and Sanford in Sioux Falls. Sanford is close to providing antibody blood tests for COVID in their own lab.

REQUEST APPROVAL OF CLAY COUNTY EMPLOYEE RETURN TO WORK POLICY

County Administrator Stephen Larson stated that Gabe Tweten and Kathy McKay met with the Personnel Issues Committee regarding the Governor’s current Stay-at-Home Order that is set to expire on May 18. A working policy was drafted that would go into effect at the time the order expires whether it is May 18 or a later date. The policy places a high importance on the health and wellbeing of staff. Initially, the County would allow appointments only with the public. Other options than meeting face to face would still be encouraged when possible. Information would also be published on the County website for different departments. Some work-from-home and flexible work would continue. Motor Vehicle would return to their policy prior to closing. They will have customers check in and then wait in their cars until they are called into the building for assistance. Initially, County buildings would remain locked and individuals with appointments would be escorted to and from appointments. The renters in the Family Service Center are in favor of the policy that is being presented. Court Administration plans to open up for some initial hearings, but jury trials would not be scheduled until June. Masks will be encouraged, but not required. There will be some additional signage for education and social distancing on floor; and placement of sneeze guards. Each employee would get a copy of this policy and the Personnel Issues Committee would continue to evaluate the policy and adjust it until business transactions are fully unrestricted.

Commissioner Weyland applauded all the staff who worked so hard on the policy. Commissioner Mongeau noted she has had employees reach out to her about some of the grey areas involving the County. Ms. McKay noted that there is protocol for staff who test positive to the virus. Public Health sends out information twice weekly and updates it on the website. They follow the MN Department of Health policy for returning to work, being quarantined, and for isolated situations. She would be happy to have a conversation with anyone to ensure the policies have been followed before returning to work.

On motion by Commissioner Weyland, seconded by Commissioner Haney, and unanimously carried, the Board approved the Clay County Employee Return to Work Policy to commence at the time the MN Stay-at-Home Order expires.

PUBLIC HEARING: PETITION FOR TEXT AMENDMENT TO COUNTY DEVELOPMENT CODE TO ALLOW PRECAST CONCRETE MANUFACTURING AS A CONDITIONAL USE IN AG GENERAL, AG SERVICE CENTER, AND HIGHWAY COMMERCIAL ZONING DISTRICTS

Members of the public were able to participate in this hearing remotely. The hearing was livestreamed on the County Facebook page as well as YouTube. Comments could also be submitted before the public hearing.

On motion by Commissioner Campbell, seconded by Commissioner Mongeau, and unanimously carried, the Board opened the public hearing.

Planning Director Matt Jacobson stated the Planning Commission heard a request on April 24, 2020 from Spring Prairie Hutterian and Brethren. They requested a Text Amendment to the Land Development Code (Ordinance) to allow for manufacturing cast concrete. Information from that meeting was included in the handouts. Following testimony, discussion, and deliberation at that meeting there was a favorable recommendation to allow the text amendment (six in favor, one abstained, and one no vote). The change would affect three zoning districts (approximately 90%) of the County. Conditional Use Permits (CUPs)

would still be required for the new use as well as other permits as necessary. This type of operation would be too large to go unnoticed if a permit was not obtained. The zoning districts affected are Agricultural General, Ag Service Centers, and Highway Commercial. The land use goals in those zoning districts are set forth in the County Comprehensive Plan. Mr. Jacobson noted that industrial manufacturing seems to be incompatible with the goals of the Comprehensive Plan although the plan has not been updated in 20 years.

The Hutterites, represented by Cornelius Wipf, submitted their petition for the text amendment through their Attorney Tami Norgard. Their particular site is zoned Ag General. A shop was permitted on their site in 2006-2007 and was then expanded in 2016-2017. The applicant submitted a building permit application for the expansion. The building was found to be non-compliant and the expansion was not permitted until the site comes into compliance. If the text amendment is approved, the applicant would then need to apply for a CUP and then a building permit. State permits may be needed as well. The facility has been there for 15 years. A CUP could contain conditions to minimize some lights, noise, travel, roads, public safety. Attorney Norgard submitted a draft Ordinance for the text amendment and Mr. Jacobson proposed some modifications to the draft based on the Planning Commission's findings. The modifications include verbiage for new operations to be required to access 10-ton roads and the setback from residents was changed from 500 feet to one-half mile. The proposed modifications were based on conversations that Mr. Jacobson had with residents who live near the current facility. The nearest resident is one-half mile from the facility. Commissioner Campbell had some questions about how an expansion of a facility would be addressed as far as requirements for roads and setbacks. The County Engineer expressed the same concerns as the current facility is accessed by two township roads that take a beating. Commissioner Mongeau stated the applicant has been willing to talk to the County Engineer about necessary road improvements. The majority of the traffic at the Hutterite site is accessing onto County Highway 26 from an existing haul road.

Attorney Norgaard stated there was a building permit requested initially and the colony has not been deceptive to the County. The building did not start out as a precast plant. She commented that the new use for the building would add to the tax base and be a huge economic development for the County. Precast concrete panels are used for many projects in the metro region. She noted that a new facility could take 800 acres. She would like the setback which started at 500 feet, was modified to 1,000 feet, and now to one-half mile, to be consistent with other setbacks in the Ordinance. She noted that there isn't an odor issue with this type of facility and the same setback as a feedlot is not needed. She reiterated that the Comprehensive Plan is 20 years old and probably needs to be updated. She added that a 10-ton road was added by the Planning Director but was not officially in the Planning Commission's motion. She noted the roads should be discussed during the CUP process instead. If this use is made too restrictive, it would be very limited.

Attorney Norgaard stated there is no need to have a requirement for an Environment Assessment Worksheet (EAW) for this type of use. Triggers in an EAW would require an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) which would be a huge, expensive process that should not be required by the County. Commissioner Campbell stated there are already regulations in place for triggering an Environmental Assessment Worksheet and that requirement should not be part of this ordinance.

Mr. Wipf asked if the setback would be from a building or from other parts of the operation such as the laydown area. The building is needed for storage but much of the operation is done in the laydown area. The cranes they use lift slowly and do not produce noise. He noted they could have 40 acres of concrete sitting for various times. He added they do not plan to use any township roads for their material. They plan to go through the gravel pit up to Co. Rd 26. He added that the township roads have never been as bad as they are currently. When asked about a future precast facility, he noted it would be north of Co Rd 26 toward the BRB Ranch. They would be willing to help with expenses for two miles of road. There would be a lot of prep work needed for a site closer to Moorhead. They would already have solidly packed soil on the intended site and would just need to spread crushed rock on it. The setback issue was further discussed and needs to be clear in the text language.

Bill Davis, Planning Commission Chair, called into the meeting and stated he agreed with Attorney Norgard and would like this use treated the same as other uses in the County.

Jim Grier was next on the line with his input on the proposal. He stated he moved into this area in Spring Prairie Township 47 years ago to be in the country. Then the Hutterites came in and expanded and are now reaching a neighborhood limit. Although they have been good neighbors and friends and they get along well, their site is turning into a major industrial complex. He was concerned about the size of their operation, further expansion, and where it will end. He also submitted these concerns in writing prior to the meeting for the record.

Lori Schlafmann stated she is also a neighbor and agrees with Jim Grier's comments. She noted concern about their expansions. She would like to see the setback for the business structures to be one-half mile from residents.

Ryan Aasheim from Greater Fargo Moorhead Economic Development Corp (GFMEDC) addressed the Board and acknowledged that this is a complex matter with a lot of factors to be weighed. He believes this business has economic development factors and fits the primary sector focus. It adds value and sales that are outside the trade area. It brings new wealth into the community and is good for the local economy. He noted interest in working with Cornelius Wipf on their facility.

Leon Schlafmann added that he has no complaints on the current operations. He will rely on the judgement and wisdom of the Planning Commission and County Board to address the permitting issues. He added that the colony is doing a good job trying to accommodate all that is being asked of them. He believes a lot of the issues will be handled with the CUP process.

Attorney Norgard stated there is \$2 million in a match grant funding available for road improvements. Mr. Wipf stated not all the buildings on the precast site are for manufacturing. There is a finishing building which does not add to traffic or any other nuisances. The expansion on Co. Rd. 26 would not be for several years but would be reduced to half the size at that time. He asked what constitutes expansion of the operation as there are many different aspects to precast concrete operations.

Commissioner Mongeau stated this is a beneficial operation to have in Clay County. She added that this is just to amend the Ordinance today. Applicants would still need to come before the Planning Commission

for a CUP which is conditioned separately. She would be in favor of a 1,000-foot setback from a facility building to a residence.

On motion by Commissioner Campbell, seconded by Commissioner Weyland, and unanimously carried, the Board closed the public hearing.

Commissioner Campbell commented that this is good positive economic development while allowing citizens being heard through the Conditional Use Permit process.

On motion by Commissioner Campbell, seconded by Commissioner Weyland, and unanimously carried, the Board approved Ordinance 2020-01 with the following modifications: Structures associated with a precast plant must be located at *1,000 feet* (rather than one-half mile) from a residential structure located on adjacent property; and under Standards, *Item 4 (direct access to a 10-ton asphalt road and EAW required)* will be deleted.

REQUEST APPROVAL OF CONSTRUCTION ENGINEERS' CHANGE ORDER #30 AND GMP INCREASE

Mr. Larson stated that Construction Engineers is wrapping up the Juvenile Center construction project and there may only be one minor change order left for the project. Change Order 30 was presented today and includes a collection of many items, some of which were already discussed, and some that came up during the construction inspection. The change order and increase to the Guaranteed Maximum Price (GMP) is \$73,844. Commissioner Campbell added that after the Finance Committee meets a final report will be issued. There should not be any additional charges to the member Counties at the Juvenile Center.

On motion by Commissioner Weyland, seconded by Commissioner Campbell, and unanimously carried, the Board approved Construction Engineers' Change Order #30 for \$73,844 with an increase to the Guaranteed Maximum Price (GMP).

REQUEST SUPPORT IN SOCIAL SERVICES FOR NYSTROM & ASSOCIATION TO PROVIDE INTEGRATED OUTPATIENT CHEMICAL DEPENDENCY AND MENTAL HEALTH TREATMENT SERVICES:

Social Services Director Rhonda Porter and Supervisor Kirstin Wegenast addressed the Board with a request for support for Nystrom and Associates to provide Integrated Outpatient Chemical Dependency and Mental Health Treatment Services.

Representatives from Nystrom and Asso. Kevin Evenson and Erin Saladin phoned into the meeting. Mr. Evenson stated their new office would be located at 2405 8th Street South in Moorhead. He has been in the business for 40 years. Their business operates as a non-profit organization. They have been successful in other parts of State with their holistic approach to the mind, body, and soul. They also work with a dietician to help improve wellbeing.

Ms. Porter stated they are a Medicaid provider. This agency would be the fifth outpatient provider in Moorhead. She would be in favor of drafting a letter of support for Nystrom as part of their application process. Ms. Wegenast commented that the mental health staff is excited to see this agency with their treatment approach come into the area. Commissioner Mongeau stated this is very relevant issue and good local treatment option.

On motion by Commissioner Weyland, seconded by Commissioner Campbell, and unanimously carried, the Board agreed to support Nystrom and Asso. for providing Integrated Outpatient Chemical Dependency and Mental Health Treatment Services in Clay County.

APPROVAL OF ASSEMBLY MODIFICATION FOR FOUR WALK “N” ROLL PACKERS

County Engineer David Overbo requested approval for four retrofit assemblies which are the links needed to connect the walk “n” roll packers to their motor graders. Funding for the links would be taken from the internal service fund.

On motion by Commissioner Mongeau, seconded by Commissioner Haney, and unanimously carried, the Board approved \$11,775 for the purchase of four retrofit assemblies for attaching their walk “n” roll packers to the motor graders.

APPROVAL OF AMENDED YEARLY GRAVEL ABSTRACT

Mr. Overbo stated the yearly gravel abstract was brought to the Board last week. He realized there was an error on it after the meeting. Aggregate Industries’ bids for Townships 13-15 was just for crushing material and did not include their hauling cost of \$10.75 per ton. That increase to Aggregate Industries’ bid reflects that Turner Sand and Gravel was low bidder for all 30 townships. Discussion ensued regarding bids from the County pit and having the correct overhead added to make it a fair process.

On motion by Commissioner Weyland, seconded by Commissioner Campbell, and unanimously carried, the Board approved the annual gravel contract to Turner Sand and Gravel for all 30 townships of the County. *See Attachment*

APPROVAL OF LETTER OF SUPPORT FOR MOORHEAD GRADE SEPARATION, SAFETY, AND MOBILITY PROJECT ON 11TH STREET

The City of Moorhead has asked for support on the Grade Separation, Safety, and Mobility Project on 11th Street. A portion of it is a County road. There have been issues with constrictions and safety with fire and police access. The City is asking for a letter of support for federal funds and \$500,000 commitment to the project. The funds were included in the draft of the five-year construction plan.

On motion by Commissioner Campbell, seconded by Commissioner Haney, and unanimously carried, the Board approved a letter of support and commitment of \$500,000 for the 11th Street Project in Moorhead.


COMMITTEE REPORTS/COUNTY ADMINISTRATOR UPDATE/DISCUSSIONS

- Commissioner Weyland attended meetings for Personnel Issues Committee; Oakport Joint Powers; and with the Solid Waste Director.
- Commissioner Haney participated in the COVID-19 FM Media Conference; attended the City of Moorhead Planning Commission meeting; and Clay County budget meeting.

- Commissioner Gross attended Personnel Issues Committee and Governor's Board. He announced that next Tuesday is the opening day to register for three Commissioner seats.
- Stephen Larson attended meetings for Personnel Issues Committee; Parking Committee; Coroner's Office Use; Solid Waste Director; County Management; FM Administrators; Budget Review for 2020; He reported the County's portion of the March sales tax as \$205,000, higher than March of the previous year. The Assessor's office has begun their annual assessments. The Dental Clinic at the Family Service Center will begin non-emergency appointments. He received a response letter from Manager Leach regarding the letter sent by the Commissioners. Clay County is at 68.7% for census reporting.
